Although Turner is reputed to have declared 'The Sun is God' shortly before he died in December 1851, there can be little doubt that Christianity in its various manifestations played a significant part in his life. From his youth onwards Turner's art was often inspired by ecclesiastical buildings and the example set by the most profound earlier painters of religious subjects, such as Titian and Rembrandt. Turner's lifetime coincided with an upsurge in religious sentiment and important developments in the practice of Christianity in England, including the building of thousands of new churches by the Church of England and the Catholic Emancipation Act. This lecture by Cecilia Powell, Editor of *Turner Society News*, will show that Christianity was more central to Turner's art than is commonly supposed.

Turner Society member Natalia Kouznetsova has long been interested in the interaction between the arts. This formed her research subject at Astrakhan Conservatoire and the Gnesin Russian Academy of Music in Moscow. The symphonic song cycle *The Prince of the Rocks* unites Turner's art with English poetry from Shakespeare to Masefield including Turner's contemporaries and the artist himself.

'MATTHEW COTES WYATT'S

WELLINGTON STATUE (1846) AND

TURNER'S HERO OF A HUNDRED FIGHTS (1847)'

Lecture by Jan Piggott

The Turner Society has been kindly invited to attend one of the regular lectures of The Society of Antiquaries of London held in their historic premises at Burlington House.

This lecture will throw new light on the greatest Fine Arts row of nineteenth-century London, the commission for the bronze equestrian 'Monster Statue' of Wellington by Matthew Cotes Wyatt and its installation atop Decimus Burton's Arch on Constitution Hill in 1846. Royal Academicians were asked individually by the government if the statue should come down; except for Turner and one other, all recommended its removal. Two letters from Turner in reply have recently come to light, and his misgivings will be discussed in the context of his relations with the Wyatt family and his admiration for Wellington, 'the Saviour of Europe'. *The Hero of a Hundred Fights*, picturing the casting of the statue, and shown at the Academy in 1847, was Turner's last

statement about the wars with France. The lecture offers a reading of this difficult painting in the light of the controversy, also taking into account its colouring, symbolism, and allusions to literature and mythology.
